Proclamation

WHEREAS, the Holocaust was the state-sponsored, systematic persecution and annihilation of more than six million Jews and millions of others including Gypsies, the handicapped, Poles, homosexuals, Jehovah's Witnesses, Soviet prisoners of war, and political dissidents under the Nazi tyranny that brutalized Europe between 1932 and 1945; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to an Act of Congress (Public Law 96-388, October 7, 1980) the United States Holocaust Memorial Council annually designates the Days of Remembrance for the victims of the Holocaust, not for memory's sake alone, but to affirm that education and dialogue are the cornerstone of a universal commitment, in the name of our common humanity, to the struggle against hatred and bigotry wherever they exist; and

WHEREAS, the history of the Holocaust offers an opportunity to reflect on the moral responsibilities of individuals, societies and governments; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey residents are encouraged to actively rededicate ourselves to principles of individual freedom in a just society; and

WHEREAS, for more than two decades, the New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education has provided a national model for programs on the Holocaust and genocide as a critical and dynamic lesson that we must always continue to speak out and fight against hatred, persecution and tyranny everywhere in the world; and

WHEREAS, this year, the United States Holocaust Memorial Council has designated the Days of Remembrance as Sunday, May 1 through Sunday, May 8, 2011, including the Day of Remembrance known as Yom Hashoah, May 1, 2011; and

WHEREAS, the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum has chosen "Justice and Accountability in the Face of Genocide: What Have We Learned?" as the theme for this year's observance, to mark the 65th anniversary of the verdicts at the first Nuremberg trial and the 50th anniversary of the trial of Adolf Eichmann, two landmark events in international justice and public awareness of the Holocaust;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, CHRIS CHRISTIE, Governor of the State of New Jersey, do hereby proclaim

in New Jersey in memory of the victims of the Holocaust and do commend the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, and the survivors, rescuers and liberators whose extraordinary stories embody the conscience of the world and teach us to overcome intolerance and indifference through education, remembrance and action.
