

Proclamation

by Governor Earl Ray Tomblin

Whereas, the Holocaust was the state-sponsored, systematic persecution and annihilation of European Jewry by Nazi Germany, and its collaborators, between 1933 and 1945; and

Whereas, about six million people were targeted for destruction or decimation for racial, ethnic or national reasons; and

Whereas, more than one and a half million innocent children were murdered; and

Whereas, the importance of teaching today's children about this unprecedented event reminds us of our solemn duty to keep the memory of the millions of people who perished during the Holocaust alive; and

Whereas, the people of West Virginia should always remember the terrible events of the Holocaust, and remain vigilant against bigotry and tyranny; and

Whereas, Days of Remembrance have been set aside for us to remember the inhumanity of those who perpetrated the Holocaust, and to reflect upon our own humanity and the need for respect of all people.


Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved that I, Earl Ray Tomblin, Governor of the Great State of West Virginia, do hereby proclaim *May 1-8, 2011*, as:

Days of Remembrance of the Victims of the Holocaust

in the Mountain State and encourage all citizens to rededicate themselves to the principles of equality and justice for all, and to overcome intolerance and indifference through learning and remembrance.
